

TALLAHASSEE REGION AACA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

July 25, 2005 5:30 p.m.

GARY EDWARDS WORKPLACE - 1430 PIEDMONT DR., NE

Present were: Gary Edwards, Andy Mohney, Bob Love, Bobby Hollingsworth, Gene Densmore and Bill Thompson. John Schanbacher, Norm Madsen and Tom Link could not attend. The following items were discussed:

- 1. 2007 Division Tour. Bill Thompson, in his capacity as Tour Chairman, discussed the importance of determining a date for the tour. He was being asked by the National Directors to set a date now so that the event calendar could be published for next year. Much discussion ensued over dates determined by college football schedules (FSU), other National events and the differences in weather between Sept. and November. Bill stated that research indicated that the FSU football schedule left open Sept. 22 and 29 since they were definitely "away" games. This being the only firm dates known to be open at this time, it was determined by the Board that we would propose Sept. 26—29, 2007 as our Tour dates.
- 2. Financial Budget. Treasurer Andy Mohney brought before the board a report of club finances. He reported that expenses for 2004 and 2005 exceeded income by a good margin and the first 6 months of this year is also running a deficit. Gary lead the discussion on ways to lessen the deficit or ways to actually turn it around through means of raising funds. The only means of income at present are member dues, the annual club auction and the monthly 50/50 drawing. Raising dues was not viewed as an option at this time and the club members will be asked to suggest other means of income generation. One method discussed would be to advertise in the monthly club newsletter, at least to support the rising costs of its' production. The newsletter editor, Bob Love, will look into this matter and report back to the board.
- 3. November Auction and Chili Dinner. The Duncan's have had the auction for three years and they would like someone else to take it over for awhile. The Herzog's are willing to do this and have plenty of room (several acres along Lake Jackson, they are on Northshore Dr. in Lakeshore). The club would need to provide a porta-john for the day as well as the "tent" we have to cover the chili serving area. There is plenty of room for parking our cars etc. and a great view to enjoy the event. It was determined to accept the Herzog's invite.
- 4. Short Tour Chairman. We need a short tour chairperson to take Ed & E'lane Shuler's place as they have resigned as chairpersons (still willing to help while not in leadership position) for the rest of the year due to some time consuming issues with their daughter. Gene Densmore has volunteered to step up and help out.

The Board Meeting was adjourned at 7:30 pm.





Restoration vs. Restification

Most of us in AACA are familiar with restoration, taking an antique automobile in some stage of wear, disrepair, and deterioration from time and the elements, and restoring it to like new condition. The goal is to bring the car back to the condition it was in when it left the factory. Unless you happen to find an original untouched car that was carefully preserved, you are going to spend some time and money on the restoration process.

Restification is the process of taking an antique or classic car and while keeping the classic period look of the car, the object is to upgrade its engine, transmission, suspension etc with modern aftermarket products utilizing modern technological advances. The end result is to have a car with classic looks but drives like a modern car complete with the comforts of air conditioning and high tech sound systems. The older versions of this are the street rods of the 20's, 30's and 40's, which often use "modern" drive trains and suspensions from the later 50's and 60's cars. The new wave of restification are the muscle cars of the 60's and early 70's. In many cases everything from the frame, suspension and drive lines are completely replaced with modern aftermarket versions while the original classic body is kept in tact.

If you have watched the program, "Overhaulin'" on the Speed Channel, you may have seen car designer Chip Foose and his team do restifications on classic cars of the 50's through the 70's. One show in particular, featured Tour de France cyclist champion Lance Armstrong, who had a worn, though original, 1969 GTO. His significant other, singer Sheryl Crow, tricked him to make him think someone stole his GTO (a common tactic on the show) while the "Overhaulin'" team disassembled and stripped the GTO only to restyle it and put in a new suspension, crate engine, transmis-

sion, etc. and even modern 18 inch custom wheels and tires, which required the fender wells to be cut and enlarged in order to accept these "monsters". Granted, the work that was done was first class, but something just doesn't look right about taking a valuable classic, such as a GTO, and making it into a "modern" classic. It reminded me of some of these aging celebrities who have excessive plastic surgery and seeing their skin stretched in ways it was never intended making them look out of place with young people as well as people their own age!

Of course, there is a place for upgrading some of the mechanics in an antique car to make them more drivable, safer, and less prone to break downs. Even though these won't win you top honors in AACA judging, it will make your car into a driver that's reasonably safe and reliable. Where I draw the line, is when it alters the style and character of the original. Why not use a period correct engine block and heads, even if you want to do some work on the internals to coax more horsepower from it, but don't replace the old iron with a modern crate engine. It's fine to upgrade the electrical from 6 to 12 volts, or the ignition from points to solid state. Even period correct aftermarket wheels, like the chrome Crager wheels of the 60's look good, but those modern 18 to 20 inch custom wheels just don't belong on the classic muscle cars of the 60's.

Bottom line, there is a place for everyone and every taste in the car hobby and everyone is entitled to do what he or she wants in restoring an antique, but is you are going to a full restification, find a car with less historical importance than a GTO, Hemi Road Runner, or SS Chevelle. Instead, take a Plymouth Valiant, Pontiac Tempest, Chevy II and have at it. We need to do what we can to preserve the timeless classics so that future generations can enjoy and appreciated them.




















Yesteryears Remember When?
