A Boat with Tailfins

The last thing we need is another project. But when a relative told us about an unusual aluminum boat with '50's car style tailfins abandoned on her family's property, we were intrigued. It was hard to imagine what such a boat would look like. The deal was tempting: we could have the boat as long as we took the old rusty trailer with it. Like most collectors, sight unseen, we knew we probably wanted it.

So, on a cold Saturday morning last November we drove to Marianna to have a look. After winding down an overgrown road, we came across the old boat. Immediately, we knew we had found something remarkable. The boat looks like part rocket, part 50's car, and part boat. The steering wheel is on the left side - like a car - which is rare for a boat. At one point in its life, somebody painted it black and yellow. But those colors were peeling to reveal the original two-toned blue and gold colors separated by aluminum molding like the paint schemes on cars from the '50s. The most fantastic feature is the tail fins painted red to look like taillights in a 1950's car. But what a mess that boat was after sitting in the woods for 20 years! Leaves, an old gas tank, '70's style shag carpeting, and a child's plastic swimming pool that

had deteriorated into a thousand pieces filled the hull. A small tree grew up from the floorboard behind the front seat and vines wrapped around everything. Otherwise, the aluminum hull was solid and undamaged with the exception of a small bullet hole. Under a thick layer of pine straw and leaves we found a "Feather Craft" emblem. We took a number of pictures and drove back to Tallahassee to do our internet research.

It didn't take long to find out that the boat is a 1958 Feather Craft Clipper, which was one of the topend models that year. These aluminum boats were manufactured in Atlanta, Georgia between 1945 and 1969. They were not painted but rather anodized, which provides an aluminum oxide layer that is harder than paint and not subject to peeling. Several websites contained many pictures of beautifully restored Feather Craft boats. When shined, they have a finish similar to a polished Airstream trailer.

We saw the potential and knew we couldn't let such an opportunity slip away. A couple of weeks later, we gathered several friends and a car trailer with a winch and freed the boat from the vines of that Marianna forest.

Hello, fellow old car enthusiasts and welcome to February! Hard to believe the first month of 2007 has already passed. (And a reminder: there's less than eleven shopping months 'til Christmas.)

As a car person, I am so grateful to be in sunny Florida! I have an email buddy in the Netherlands who can only drive his collector car six months of the year. The rest of the time it is up on blocks, garage-bound and awaiting warmer times. Another friend in Colorado has been trying to send me pictures of his Packard since early December. The snow has seldom cleared enough for him to drive it out of the barn. Classic cars driven on the salted winter roads of the north will quickly become rust buckets. Isn't it wonderful to be in Tallahassee, where the driving season lasts all year long?

Although the best months have yet to arrive, the car hobby is already in full swing. The Moultrie show and swap meet is right around the corner and Zephyrhills is not far behind. And local Cruise-Ins can be enjoyed every weekend.

On Sunday, January 28th I attended the annual Devereaux-Kaiser Car Show in Sarasota (named for the two men who started the event 38 years ago.) The show is sponsored by the Sunshine Region AACA. Despite cold weather and the threat of rain, 675 cars were on display, plus another 50 or so in the car corral. The cars included high-point high-dollar vehicles, but mostly they were wonderful old "driver" cars (more like mine), and also some great original vehicles. It was a no-pressure show---no entry fee and no judging. Just the way I like it---lots of great cars and lots of friendly people.

After the show, I went to the Sarasota Classic Car Museum. I visited this museum as a young boy while on a family vacation, and it helped spark my interest in antique cars. Originally opened in 1953 as "Horn's Cars of Yesterday," the museum has about 100 original and well-restored vehicles, many of which are very rare or have interesting histories. Included were three original conveyances from the Ringling estate, several Beatles' autos, two early '50s Muntz Jet cars (produced by entrepreneur "Madman" Muntz), several racy Iso Rivolta sports cars and a handful of unique prototype vehicles. See this museum while you can---FSU has purchased the property (which is across from FSU's Ringling Museum and theater), and the attendant said that it may be closing in a few years.

Congratulations and thank you to Bob Love! The club website is among the best AACA sites in the nation and Bob has earned the coveted AACA Master Webmaster Award for the fourth consecutive year. He and Carol will be attending the 71st AACA Annual Meeting in Philadelphia on February 8-10, where he will be presented the Award. 



Bill is semi-retired from a career as an engineering technician but works part time as a draftsman for Main Street Design studio in Quincy.


Nancy is in her 34th year of teaching elementary school, currently at Crawfordville Elementary.

For Bill it would be the many friends in the hobby we have known over three decades of membership and good times touring together.


For Nancy it has been the friends she has made and traveling on AACA tours such as the Founder's Tours to Ohio and California.
