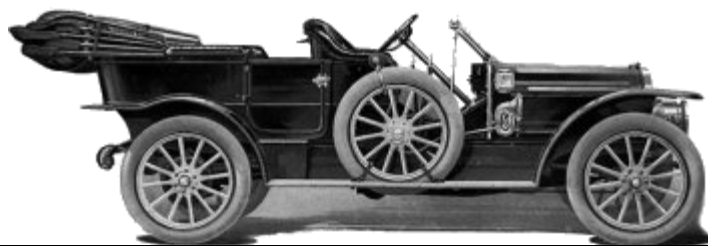

premature wear in the bearings, valve lifters, gears, etc. This applies to all engines without full-flow oil filter systems (which is most pre-1960s engines, and some newer than this). None of my antique cars have full-flow oil filters, so I have been quite concerned.

The oils that are supposed to be problematic for our old cars will have an API SERVICE rating (usually printed on the back of the oil bottle inside a circle) of SM or SL. Oil with an SM rating is the biggest problem, because it contains NO zinc. The SL oil is a little better, but has reduced zinc. Some of the older-type oils, rated SJ or SH still have zinc added, and so are better. I have stopped using SM-rated oils, and I use an additive if I use SL-rated oils.

I hope to get my oil expert to speak about this matter in an upcoming club meeting.

Since my only child just made the leap, turning 16 last September, I have had a while to think about how to keep youth interested in the hobby I've enjoyed so much. We've been in those awkward years where he is too old to play with toy cars on the floor with imaginary roads, but not old enough nor doesn't have enough money and attention span to start and complete a restoration.

The number one thing necessary to pass our hobby down to offspring is time. You have to spend time with them for them to appreciate your interests.

There are a multitude of peripheral hobbies which the too young and under funded can participate in which will slide right in or become a part of your car hobby. Some activities which either Nathan or myself have participated in include:

Gas station memorabilia (called petrobia) — A collection of signage or oil company advertising, cans or old equipment can really compliment your garage décor.

License plates collecting — Do you have corresponding plates for your state for the year of each of your collector cars? Or, how about the same year plates for each state you have visited with your collector car? Might be a fun thing to look for? Or, how about a plate for each the birth years of your children and yourself?

Literature and advertising — This doesn't have to be old. Free literature is as close as your local car dealership. And hang on to it. It will get old. I have pieces that I collected when I was a small child, which can document show cars now.

Photography — Son Nathan has been particularly involved with this one. He has shown some of his car photos as 4-H projects at the local county and state fairs, or they would also work in an open class at county fairs if you are not connected with 4-H.

Model cars — I have enjoyed model cars since I was 5, and now as one who no longer even qualifies as a young adult even by AACA standards, I still like them.

My particular favorites are those models made between 1958 and the mid 1970's. I particularly like the "annuals," those models that were made for only one year to correspond with the new models of real cars. Models are a good way of learning what various parts of a car are and how a real car is constructed. And they can be great to learn how to distinguish various eras, brands and models of real cars.

With a little patience, the looking for models or any other peripheral hobbies at rummage/garage sales, swap meets, flea markets, antique shops and of course Ebay can compliment the quest to find items for your real car project. And, it provides a diversion to have your young one have something to look for while you are searching for some part for your project.

This yard was started in 1985 and being changed over with new management since 2004. It's been a family business with Jack Alsup and son Jack Jr. in their 3rd year at this location, but they've been in the salvage business since 1961. They have done an outstanding job in cleaning up, removing trees, under-growth, old junk and non profit making auto items.

I was in this yard in 1995 and it was a job to find your way around and remove any parts you may need. All vehicles are inventoried, numbered and bad parts marked and good parts logged for online sale and inventory control. They use some of the latest programs for cross referencing parts and locating the storage of same. They have setup racks, bins and shelving to support customer's needs and to give quick response to parts requests. The 10 acre yard is still being worked on but it is clean and level with sand/dirt base with little mud and vehicles spaced for easy parts pulling. They pull their own parts but will allow customers in the yard to validate the correct parts needed. Jack and family still enjoy old cars and, while you're there, see Mike about a couple for sale in storage area. At this time 3 originals (39 Plymouth coupe, 55 Ford V8 4dr automatic Custom, and a 50 Pontiac 4dr 3speed) are available with Pontiac parts cars in the yard.

The inventory basically is autos 1980s and up and trucks 1970 and up and everyone was pleasant to talk to and work with. They will and do ship parts on request. If you are in the area or need a part for the family vehicle stop in or give them a call for your needs.

Junkyard Dog and Fluffy generally have lunch together along with a few other car nuts every Friday at "The Station". Welcome to everyone! A few weeks ago Bill Brundyge needed a part for his 48 Dodge coupe. (R vent window frame) I told Bill to hold off until I return from my vacation next week and I'll check a junkyard that has a few old Dodges.

The first yard had one 48 Chrysler with the part but not much better than his. Just east of Richmond VA, I toured another yard finding 9 old Dodges with 5 missing the vent frame completely and 4 in worse shape than any others I had seen. Sorry I couldn't help Bill but I did find a 1952 (?) Packard convertible (parts car) for Norm. Must say any day in a junkyard is not all bad.

One of the more obscure special statewide license plates issued by the state of Florida is this 1992 Columbus Jubilee.



I don't ever remember seeing one when they were current - do you? I am a little confused about the Quincentennial (500 years) anniversary of Florida. That may have been fudging a bit! The whole US Quincentennial thing was mired in problems. In fact, by 1990 the commission was \$600,000 in arrears and the chairman resigned!

I don't think many of these plates were sold and today are quite scarce and usually sell for \$125 and up. I paid only \$6.47 for the one shown here as it was in a group of 9 other miscellaneous plates and has a small nail hole in the center near the upper edge. Talk about a plate loaded with (mis) information - it has no less than 80 characters - 59 letters and 21 numbers plus a picture of a sailing ship and a small outline of the state! Try reading all that on a car ahead of you while waiting at a traffic light. Here is some information I found on the web:

* 1991 - The Quincentennial License plate was approved for issuance for the purpose of educational and promotional activities for the celebration of Florida's participation in the 1992 World's Fair in Seville, Spain. This plate became obsolete January 1, 1994. (Does that mean it could not be sold after December 31, 1993?)

* Florida 1992 - "Columbus Jubilee 1492-1992 The Quincentennial State". Sorry, but Columbus never made it to Florida during any of his voyages to the new world, or to any other U.S. state, for that matter. His 1492 voyage took him to the eastern Bahamas, Cuba, and what is now Haiti and the Dominican Republic. Florida therefore has no basis for its claim of being the

"Quincentennial State".

The second plate is from Nassau, Bahamas also celebrating the first voyage of Columbus. (Paid \$19 for this one.) I think the Bahamas has a better claim to the anniversary than the US. Also I thought Portugal financed the trip of the Italian Columbus so why the celebration in Spain? Oh, well - who am I to argue with current historians!
