Things of Interest to the Hobby

U.S. Federal Issues

Cash for Clunkers: After months of contentious debate, lawmakers enacted a \$3 billion "Cash for Clunkers" bill that paid consumers to scrap cars and trucks getting 18 miles per gallon or less in exchange for a cash voucher to buy a new car. Consumers received a \$3,500 or \$4,500 credit depending on the fuel economy improvement of the new vehicle. SEMA convinced lawmakers to exclude vehicles that were 25 years old or older from being scrapped. The provision served to safeguard vehicles that may possess unique historic or aesthetic value and are irreplaceable to hobbyists as a source of restoration parts. The program also allowed all parts, except the engine, to be recycled. During the clunkers debate, SEMA argued that a better environmental approach would have been to support vehicle repairs, installation of specialty equipment to reduce emissions and increase fuel economy, and engine recycling.

Ethanol-15: The SAN submitted comments to the EPA opposing a request to allow the ethanol content of gasoline to increase to 15% (from 10%). The SAN cited concern that the additional content could harm automobile parts of all ages, including special-interest collector and historic vehicles. A number of other organizations expressed similar concerns. Tests using ethanol concentrations of up to 20% have shown a notable increase in wear on vehicle fuel systems produced up through model-year '95, and especially for pre-'90 vehicles. Fuel pumps, tanks, seals, hoses and other rubber components are particularly subject to failures. The EPA is expected to rule on the issue in December 2009.

Collecting Vintage Tools VII, Dodge Tool Kits 1914-1928

In my first tool article (Chassee July 2009) I talked about tool kits in general and included a picture of the tools for 1914-1928 Dodge cars/trucks. The two cylinder tire pump and the starting crank for this kit were pictured and discussed in subsequent articles. Shown here are some of these Dodge kit tools.

In the *first picture* below are 3 open end wrenches made by Moore Drop Forging Co. who also made wrenches for Ford. While modern wrenches have the sizes marked on them these have part numbers but not sizes on the wrenches. Starting on the left DB 66 Q-6164 (3/8x7/16 in), DB 20 or DB 21 Q-6165 (5/8x9/16 in) and DB 61 Q-1191 (3/4x7/8 in). Next are 2 screwdrivers, a hammer and 2 sockets. The bottom is a sparkplug socket and has an opening of 1-1/32 and 29/32 inch. The top socket has an opening of 11/32 inch and would be correct for a Dodge truck. The pliers have the McKaig Hatch Mfg. Co. logo i.e. MH. Next is an 11 inch adjustable wrench (11 auto) and then the hub wrench with a Dodge hub/grease cap. After 1928 when Chrysler bought out Dodge Brothers, Dodge tools were no longer made by Moore Drop Forging Co. and McKaig Hatch MFG. Co. as Chrysler already had contracts with Fairmount, Barcalo and Williams Mfg. Co.

The second picture shows more tools listed in the Dodge Tools and Equipment List . On the top are pressed wrenches. These were essentially stamped out of a flat piece of steel. The small wrench on the bottom right is an ignition wrench with two feeler gauges, one marked "distributor" and the other "sparkplug". The Delco part number is 12741 and the Dodge part number is L-4879. All of the early Dodge tools have a part number starting with the letter "L" even though the tools may not be so marked. Later tool part numbers start with "DD". Its interesting that the wrenches marked Q-6164, Q-6165 and Q-1191 are shown with Dodge part numbers L-6164, L-6165 and L-1191.

The *third picture* shows an Eagle oil can and an Alemite grease gun used in the Dodge kit. There were a number of different grease gun styles used over the years so its hard to say which is correct for which years. This Alemite gun has instructions marked on the cylinder.

A Kimball jack along with an ad dated 1919 is shown in the *last picture number 4*. This jack is thought to be included in the trunk of Dodge cars in the 1920's.
