Gene treated us with a slide show of a part of his license plate collection focused on 1930 plates. He showed slides of his collection of 1930 plates from all states (except Alaska). He brought them all with him to view after the program. We learned tidbits of license plate lore from each state. Most significant was the use of the word "iodine" on South Carolina's plates. South Carolina started with the word "Iodine" on the 1930 plate and expanded the phrase for several years. They were touting the amounts of iodine found in fruits and vegetables grown in the state and it died down with the advent of iodized salt in the 1940's. In addition, we learned that plate sizes were standardized to 6"X12" since 1956.

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
Watermelon Festival

Monticello, FL

16 June 2007

The watermelon has been a major part of Jefferson county's agriculture economy for over 100 years. Monticello used to be called the watermelon capital of the south primarily because the watermelon provided over 85 percent of the pollinated seed that was sold to companies all over. This seed was then sold to growers all over the world. Declining sales and crop disease eventually halted sales around 1979. Currently, Western states such as Colorado have taken over seed production as they have less humidity and a better growing environment. In 1998 there were only 22 growers listed. Many of the old time growers have passed away and only about 5 growers are left in Jefferson county.

Folks still come from all over to Monticello to pay tribute to that succulent, vine ripe, red beauty that satisfies an appetite on a hot Summer day. It was at this 57th annual watermelon festival that 3 TRAACA members drove their antique cars in the parade. Norm Madsen's 1954 Packard, John Schanbacher's 1965 Chevy and Craig McCollum's 1970 Jaguar XKE represented the club with signs on their doors. We were formally announced via the PA system at the Court House roundabout.

Stanley Steamers

Belle tracked down the driver of the car we saw in town and found out that she was the Great-Granddaughter of Frances Edgar (FE) Stanley, the inventor of the steam car. She said her husband and someone else had built 2 reproductions of a 1906 Stanley steamer model H Vanderbilt Cup Racer. Turns out that the hotel was the Stanley Hotel built by Freelan Oscar (FO) Stanley 1907 -1909. FE and FO were twins. While FE invented the steam car both brothers manufactured cars together. FO even used a 12 passenger Stanley Steamer Mountain Wagon to transport hotel guests back in the day. I guess the Stanley Steamers I had seen in previous visits to Estes Park were recreating history.

Steam cars are mechanically simple compared to gas powered internal combustion engined cars. They have fewer parts, were reliable (compared to gas cars), and didn't need a transmission. In 1900 over half the cars were steam powered. The Stanley's bragged that they would give you a new car if you could hold the throttle open for more than 3 minutes. No one could, as the power (torque) was huge.

Jean: A 1957 Thunderbird.


What do you like most about the antique car hobby?

HAVE A GREAT JULY! I look forward to seeing you at the next meeting on July 10th for our monthly meeting at the Antique Car Museum!


AND, ON A PERSONAL NOTE

Since my only child just made the leap, turning 16 last September, I have had a while to think about how to keep youth interested in the hobby I've enjoyed so much. We've been in those awkward years where he is too old to play with toy cars on the floor with imaginary roads, but not old enough nor doesn't have enough money and attention span to start and complete a restoration.

The number one thing necessary to pass our hobby down to offspring is time. You have to spend time with them for them to appreciate your interests.

There are a multitude of peripheral hobbies which the too young and under funded can participate in which will slide right in or become a part of your car hobby. Some activities which either Nathan or myself have participated in include:

Gas station memorabilia (called petrobilia) — A collection of signage or oil company advertising, cans or old equipment can really compliment your garage décor.

License plates collecting — Do you have corresponding plates for your state for the year of each of your collector cars? Or, how about the same year plates for each state you have visited with your collector car? Might be a fun thing to look for? Or, how bout a plate for each the birth years of your children and yourself?

Literature and advertising — This doesn't have to be old. Free literature is as close as your local car dealership. And hang on to it. It will get old. I have pieces that I collected when I was a small child, which can document show cars now.

Photography — Son Nathan has been particularly involved with this one. He has shown some of his car photos as 4-H projects at the local county and state fairs, or they would also work in an open class at county fairs if you are not connected with 4-H.

Model cars — I have enjoyed model cars since I was 5, and now as one who no longer even qualifies as a young adult even by AACA standards, I still like them.

My particular favorites are those models made between 1958 and the mid 1970's. I particularly like the "annuals," those models that were made for only one year to correspond with the new models of real cars. Models are a good way of learning what various parts of a car are and how a real car is constructed. And they can be great to learn how to distinguish various eras, brands and models of real cars.

With a little patience, the looking for models or any other peripheral hobbies at rummage/garage sales, swap meets, flea markets, antique shops and of course Ebay can compliment the quest to find items for your real car project. And, it provides a diversion to have your young one have something to look for while you are searching for some part for your project.

1934 ARIZONA - MOHAVE COUNTY

Copper mining in Arizona has always been an important industry. Even today Arizona supplies 65% of all copper mined in the US. For three years (1932-1934) Arizona produced all state vehicle license plates from copper (in a patented process) to advertise the great copper mines in the state and make plate painting easier and cheaper. This is the only time in the United States, license plates were made from copper. The 1934 issue is the most valuable of the three years and the only one to show a patent number! Not visible in the picture on the very bottom edge, left of center in tiny letters, is "PAT. No. 1898379". "License Plate Values", 9th edition, lists the 1934 Arizona as \$100 in "Good" and \$200 in "Very Good" condition. The plate shown grades "Good" to "Very Good" and was purchased on eBay for \$110.68 about 2 years ago. Measuring 10 5/16" by 5 9/16" the plate weighs 4.8oz. A modern Florida aluminum plate is 12" by 6" (national standard) and weighs 3.6oz.

In researching the patent, I found the idea was to be able to color the plate with one pass of a paint roller. The shiny copper (well, it was shiny in 1934) made another color unnecessary. The patent was filed July 5, 1932 and granted February 21, 1933.

ALPCA (Automobile License Plate Collectors Association) six grading standards are: "Poor"; "Fair"; "Good"; "Very Good"; "Excellent"; "Mint". The standards for "Good" and "Very Good" are:

"GOOD" - Some minor surface deterioration. All metal intact, no tears. Obvious signs of use or deterioration, but still very displayable. Closed pin holes and small nail holes on metal plates. Up to two geometrically well placed drilled holes 1/8" or smaller. Some chipping into informational content on porcelain plates (ALPCA has in the past suggested no more than 2% foreground, 3% background). Left-over plates with significant paint deterioration. Most

defects on display not noticed from 25 or more feet away.

"VERY GOOD" - Minor paint or surface fading or a few scratches, showing signs of use. No extra holes, drilled or nailed. No rust on front of plate. No retouching of paint or magic marker touchups on reflectorized tags. On porcelain plates, no chipping in informational content, such as state name, registration number, and date. On left-over plates which were never used, but have some weather damage, many will fall into this category.

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
