My 3rd & 4th cars

My 3rd and 4th cars were purchased together. In the Summer of 1965, I saw an ad in the local newspaper which listed a number of cars located about 80 miles from my parents house. Two of the cars were Star's, a 1926 and 1927. This interested me as my first car was a 1926 Star and I had not located any Star cars (for restoration comparison or parts) since I bought mine in 1960. The asking price was cheap so I borrowed a trailer and hooked it up to my 2nd car, a 1938 Ford and headed out. The seller told me he was selling his cars that were damaged in a flood that Spring. Flood or not, the cars were actually in better condition than my 1st car and the price was cheap. He said I had to take both as he wouldn't sell just one. I said OK. He helped load the trailer twice as it took two trips.

The attached pictures show the cars when I got them home. Note that those old tires still held air.



Although it was a few years since I was the paper boy, locating garage storage space was no problem as not much had changed in the neighborhood. The usual deal, mow the yard and shovel snow in exchange. That first Summer I cleaned the mud out to determine what parts were worth saving. The 4 door sedan was in the best condition both body and mechanical. I had to drain the flood water out of the engine crankcase. Surprisingly the engine was in great shape after cleaning and I was able to get it to run. Not much else got done that Summer as I added car number 5 and was attending the University of Iowa in the Fall.

Over the Winter I was thinking of my car plans. I

don't remember which Summer after that I started a restoration on the Star 4dr sedan. Call this my 3rd car. After disassembly I towed my car to the business location where they sandblasted my first car for \$30. Prices had gone up so I made a deal and rented the same sandblaster for \$30 and did the work myself at their location using their sand. I knew how to do it as I had watched them do my 1st car. What I didn't realize was how physically hard it was. Next I pounded out the dents. The only rust was on the surface which was cleaned off by sand blasting. That same Summer I painted the car, blue body with black fenders, at my cousin's garage using their paint equipment. I had watched the shop paint my first car plus I couldn't afford to pay the going rate. I also sent all the bright work out for plating. That's when it didn't cost an arm and a leg. I think it was the following Summer that I tackled the upholstery. I obtained matching material via mail order. I kept all the old stuff for patterns so the only hard part was learning to sew with my Mom's sewing machine. Can't believe she let me do that unless she didn't like to sew and was hoping I'd break it.

A couple guys about my age who lived fairly close were coming over to watch my restoration progress. They must have gotten motivated as one guy bought a 1920's Dodge that year. The other guy ended up buying my other Star(4 th car) that I had stripped for parts. He had located another Star about 30 miles out of town and was going to try to restore it using parts from the car he bought from me. I ended up painting the car for him.

After graduation I took a job in Hawaii. I tried to drive my first car to California but that's another story. All my other cars were stored.

Eventually I put an ad in Car & Parts for the 4 door sedan Star (3rd car). A Mr. Bob Porter from Panama City, Florida sent me a check for my asking price. We arranged a time when I was back in Iowa and he drove up with a trailer.



This color picture shows the completed Star 4dr sedan with my 2 boys sitting on the running board.

Last time I saw that car was when it was on the trailer being towed up the street. What happened to it?

My next story will be about my 5th car, a 1931 Durant acquired while I still had three Star cars. Mr. William (Bill) Durant formed General Motors and was the maker of the Star car.

I have found a 1933 that is just what I was seeking. I was hoping to drive it to the Cairo show, but it has a few issues I must solve first. The man I bought the Packard from told me the car was being sold with only one guarantee---that <u>something</u> would eventually go wrong! Isn't that always the case with these wonderful old vehicles? Yes, but for me solving problems is just part of the fun.

The problem keeping me from driving the car to Cairo is lubrication. These cars came with an automatic chassis lubrication system, made by the Bijur Company. As the car is driven, oil is automatically pumped onto nineteen points of the chassis (and when you park it, nineteen points on the floor). My pump is not working, and until I locate repair parts, the car will remain in my garage, where I will have to settle for looking at it. (That's OK...I like looking at it.)



"Getting To Know You"

AACA Member Profile: Dan Isaacs

Interviewed by Gary Edwards



What is your occupation? I manage homeowners associations.

How did you become interested in the antique car hobby?

Since the time I was in elementary school, I've been interested in cars and always followed them. In high school I was interested in muscle cars and in Corvettes. My first car was a 1949 Crosley.

How did you come to join the Tallahassee Region of AACA?

I was more interested in original cars and classics more so than in rods and customs, so when I found out about AACA, I joined the local group.

What was one of your favorite cars when you were growing up?

That's easy, it has to be Corvettes. My fourth car was a 1965 Corvette with a 396 and 425 horsepower.

What is your favorite antique car?

Probably my 1966 Corvair convertible.

Share a story about one of your cars that is a special memory?

My first car was a 1949 Crosley, what was called the Hot Shot model. I owned it from 1958 until 1961 when I bought a 1963 Triumph TR3. A few years ago, in 2000, I went to Cleveland, Ohio for my mother's funeral. As was our custom, my best friend from high school and I went out to dinner together. During the meal he said, "I think I found your first car!" The rest of my time in Cleveland, I was occupied with settling my mother's estate, so I didn't pursue it any further until I had returned to Tallahassee when I tried to locate my friend to find out more about the Crosley but never did get in touch with him. Fast forward to June of 2006, I was looking through my Hemmings and came across an article about a Crosley truck, so I got to wandering, "what does a Crosley sell for these days?" When I looked it up, I found three Crosleys listed for sale. One of them was a 1949 Hot Shot Crosley that had a 216

area code, which I knew to be in Cleveland. "It's not likely to be the same car", I thought, but I called anyway. It was my high school buddy Norton who said, "I have your car! They found a letter under the floor covering that was addressed to your mother."

Is there another car you do not currently own that you'd like to have?

A 1965 Corvette Sting Ray convertible with a 396 425 hp. I did acquire a project car that someday I plan to restore.

What do you like most about the antique car hobby?

I enjoy meeting other people who appreciate the cars as much as I do and I also enjoy driving the cars and touring in them.


What AACA National Tours and Shows have you participated in?


