




















# Hear Ye, Hear Ye!

It is still not too late to help out with the A.A.C.A. S. E. Divisional Tour coming up November 11 - 14th. So far there has been very good response from our members to help. Posted below is the list that I have for volunteers and their assigned task(s), since some have offered to help in more than one area, and several are taking off from work for the entire 3 days of the tour. Of course, Monday is Veterans Day and some may have off anyway. The point is, if you want to help out, just show up and we can probably use you.

In general, here's what you can expect for each of the jobs that we know of at this time:

Hotel Greeter - will be available on Sunday, Nov. 11th from about 9 am until 3 pm when the registration desk closes down to go to the opening ceremony at the new antique car museum. Meet and greet tourists as they arrive and make them feel welcome. At least one person will need to stay behind at the hotel and guide late comers to the museum because you know it will happen.

Museum Guide - will be available on Sunday, Nov. 11th from Noon until 5 pm to answer questions from tourists about the museum and possibly some of its contents.

Ticket Taker - will work on just one day or several, depending on availability and will stand (or sit) at the entrance to the various attractions and take tickets from the tourists. This will include the antique car museum, Wakulla Springs entrance & lunch, History Museum, Seminole Dam, Marianna Caverns, Pebble Hill and banquet. You should smile and greet people and possibly thank them for being on the tour. At least two should work the banquet to collect tickets on Wednesday the 14th.

Ice Cream server - will work Sunday only from about 4 - 6 pm or until the ice cream runs out. You will simply dish ice cream in reasonable amounts to each tourist. We plan on serving about 8 - 10 servings per one gallon of ice cream to make it last.

Helper - will be available to work where needed, possibly to run errands or fill in for another job in case that person becomes too tired, ill or does not show up.

Chairs - these are your daily tour guides who are responsible for all of the day's events for their tour day. Be ready to help them out when they ask and consider all the work they have put into making this tour a success.

Assistants - are members primarily chosen by the Chairs to help them with the daily events for their tour day. They should know where and when they will be each hour of the tour day to help.

Traffic Control - club members who will be at the designated tour locations where there are cars turning into event entrances to wave the cars in and keep them

moving as much as possible. They are not cops, but will do what they can to provide safety for the tour cars.

Lunch Ticket Taker - Specific job will be to take tickets from tourists at each restaurant entrance to help determine the amount of the bill for meals, but in general the tickets will tell us how many tourists participated in the designated meals.

Goodie Bags - helpers will fill the plastic bags provided with various items to give away to the tourists at registration. Possibly one person will need to assist at registration if Bob & Carol Love are really busy.

Security Coordinator - will work with his helpers to watch the tour cars each night in a designated area to make sure they are not harmed. They will work in shifts and these guys really deserve our thanks for this job. Do you like staying up all night?

Safety Inspector - will visually check all of the tour cars for potential problems such as a sagging tail pipe, exposed wires hanging out, near flat tires, no fire extinguisher, broken lenses, burned out stop lights, missing tour car I.D.s, etc. and remind the owners in a very nice way.

Photographer - will record in pictures the tour events each day for our national publication Antique Automobile

Mechanic - will be available to answer questions about possible mechanical problems and help fix problems for tour cars.

Snack Wagon - helpers will load up their snack wagon with drinks and snacks for the tourists and be at each designated stop on the tour. They will give out the treats when asked and in general be good will ambassadors.

Club Banners - volunteers will hang the welcome tour banner and club banner where needed for the tourists to feel welcome.

Door Prizes - A great deal of effort is going into this venture - we need help with collecting items for door prizes. We are going to raffle the gifts in the hospitality room for one dollar per ticket. Instead of giving away prizes at random, our guests will bid on items by purchasing tickets that will be drawn at the banquet. The winners will be familiar with the prizes and will have wanted to win them. The club will make some money and everyone has a chance to win.

Please make an effort to help out with this either with a purchased gift, a donation or simply help prepare the items for the raffle by setting them up in the hospitality room.

Hospitality Helpers - are the same as hotel greeters, only they may also help greet people at events throughout the tour. They will mingle and mix with the tourists and ask if they can help, or be available for questions.




Look closely at the two pictures of 1951 Florida plates. See the difference? It is a little subtle but notice the shape of the 4 mounting holes on each plate. The Duval County (Prefix "2") has the standard oval holes. The holes were (and still are) made oval to allow for slight differences in vehicle mounts for license plates. Everything was going fine in the Florida prison which made license plates for the state until a fire broke out destroying the license plate manufacturing building shortly after beginning to make the '51 plates. Well license plates still had to be made for 1951 so the job was farmed out to a company in Georgia. The Dade County (Prefix "1") has round mounting holes and therefore was manufactured in Georgia. For some reason (perhaps they didn't have an oval punch) all plates made in Georgia had the round holes! I think very few 1951 plates were made in Florida because they are quite scarce although prices do not reflect this. Just try and find a '51 plate with oval holes!

Also unique to 1951 is the slogan "Keep Florida Green". The "Sunshine State" slogan began with the '49 plates and with the exception of 1951 and 1965 ("400th Anniversary") has been used ever since. The plates are made of steel, 12 X 5 1/4 (vs the standard 12 X 6 adopted in 1956) and weigh 7.2 ounces. The correct colors are dark green on yellow. The Dade County plate cost \$28.82 and the Duval County plate cost \$22.45 - condition is not as good on this plate.
