Simplified Wheel Alignment

Every article I've read pertaining to wheel alignment usually gives a way to set up toe-in after a repair and then instructs the reader to go directly to a professional alignment shop. This is good advice and I'm not going to suggest that you can do a better job in your garage. On the other hand I've never needed to take any of the cars I've ever owned to an alignment shop.

Generally a car needs an alignment if the tires are wearing unevenly, it isn't steering correctly or after a repair. Most steering problems are the result of worn, bent, or broken parts. No sense spending time aligning the wheels if all the parts are not in good condition. I'm not going to address how to trouble shoot steering problems in this article.

What I want to cover is an easy "my definition" way for the car collector to determine if wheels are in alignment. If you follow my method you should be able to determine if there is a problem that needs correction prior to your next tour.

Only you can decide if you can make the repairs or adjustments yourself.

The method usually given to check toe-in is to measure the distance between the front wheels at two different places 180 degrees apart. For example a stick is placed on the tire sidewall at the front of the car and a mark/tape placed on the stick where the tread is on the other tire. Next the stick is moved to the back side of the front tires and a comparison is made with how the mark/tape lines up with the identical tread. If the difference is over 1/4 inch you have too much toe-in or toeout. While I have done this many times, its not that quick or accurate plus you have to lay on the garage floor.


My simplified method is to use string. First make sure the tires have proper inflation and are the same sizes. Next, find the center location for your steering wheel by turning it left and right counting the number of turns in each direction. You want to position the steering wheel so that it takes an equal number of turns in each direction. Place some masking tape on the wheel to mark this position ether at the top or bottom. If the spokes of the steering wheel are not symmetrical at this position it indicates something is not right. A problem is also indicated if the front wheels are not approximately straight ahead.

You can still continue with the following alignment check prior to correction of the centering problem.

Now for the string. You need a length of string longer than the length of the car and strong enough to pull tight. Tie one end of the string to an object at the rear of the car about 1/3 the height of the tire off the ground. I usually use a jack stand, but have used gas cans, chairs, etc.

Place the jack stand with the attached string slightly inside the outer edge of the rear tire and run the string up past the front tire and tie it to another movable object at the same height as the rear. The objective is to have the string form a straight line parallel with the sidewalls of the front and rear tires. On most cars you do this by having the string actually touch the rear part of the rear tire and moving your front string attachment point towards the center line of the car so that the string just barely touches the front part of the rear tire and both front and rear sides of the front tire. This requires a little skill so the best way to start is by locating the front string a couple inches away (wider) from the front tire and then moving it in a little at a time. Compare the distance from the tires to the string. Ideally the distance will be equal (allowing for the manufactures toe-in specification) indicating that the front wheel is tracking the same line as the rear tire.

The reason for placing the string 1/3 up the tire is to keep the string from touching anything other than the tires. At the mid point of the wheel the hub cap usually sticks out farther then the tire. Fenders and running boards also can get in the way.



Each car is different so the placement of the string may require some adjustments. The closer the string is to the center of the wheel the better.

Remember the tape on the steering wheel? If you need to adjust the tie rods to get the string to have the same spacing between front and rear of the front tire sides, you should only do this adjustment when the steering wheel is centered. Repeat for the other side of the car. You should also note the distances between the string and the sides of the car to determine if they are the same.

If you can't get the string to line up with the wheels it may indicate that the rear axle is wider or narrower than the front. Check this by moving the string about an inch away from the tires and see if you can get the distances equal. Worst case will be that the rear axle is not aligned with the body. This would make the car go down the road at a slight angle.

Once you master this technique it only takes about 5 minutes to check. You will also get better at identifying potential problems. Note that castor and camber alignment are not checked by the string method. I hope this article straightened you and your car out.

The 1941 Georgia is considered by many collectors the best, most beautiful, most innovative plate ever issued. Of course these superlatives are in the eye of the beholder. There is, however, little question this peachy plate is one of the most popular. The large image of the peach is a decal - the first ever used. The decal is rather fragile so very few examples survive in good condition. The border, the registration numbers, "GA 41", and "PEACH STATE" are painted with reflective paint, again the first time this was ever tried. Apparently it was not very successful because Georgia did not use reflective material again until 1971! 1941 is also the last year Georgia issued plates for the front and rear of all vehicles. The slogan "Peach State" was used in 1940 and 1941 and again from 1947 through 1970. From 1990 to the present it is on all Georgia plates. Florida tried using reflective paint on a limited basis in 1955 for the smaller counties. All Florida plates were reflective from 1965 on.

The 1941 Georgia plate is 6 1/2 x 14 inches, reflective yellow on blue, made of steel and weighs 10.8 ounces. In comparison, a current Florida plate is the now standard 6 x 12 inches, made of aluminum and weighs 3.7 ounces. The pictured plate is graded "Excellent" by ALPCA standards and is valued in the ninth edition of "License Plate Values" at \$175. It is from the collection of Gene Densmore and was purchased from a fellow collector several years ago for \$225. (I have not been able to find one as nice as this any cheaper!)


